Regarding Holy Communion

Our altar is The Lord's Table and all baptized Christians (baptized in the Name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit) are welcome to receive Holy Communion here.

In the Anglican tradition, Communion is received in two kinds: in the Bread and in the Wine. The Bread is offered first and is typically placed in one's open palm. After hearing the words "The Body of Christ, the bread of Heaven," the bread is ready to be consumed. A chalice bearer will then offer the Wine.

We offer two chalices for Holy Communion. The first, smaller chalice is for intinction (dipping the wafer into the chalice.) The second, larger chalice is for consumption. If you would prefer to drink from the cup, please hold the wafer in front of you until the larger chalice is offered

If you or your children are not baptized, or are not yet receiving communion, you may receive a blessing at the altar rail from the Priest. Simply cross your hands over your chest as you kneel at the rail.

Ladies, please "blot" your lipstick prior to receiving communion, as this will help preserve our beautiful altar linens.

The Lighting of the Fourth Advent Candle

The Beckmanns

On the Fourth Sunday in Advent we light this candle and remember the carpenter Joseph, the father of our Lord.

A Reading from Matthew 1:20–21.

But as Joseph considered his betrothal to Mary, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, “Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.” (Matthew 1:20–21)

Today we give thanks for the witness of Joseph, who guided and protected our Lord as his Father. Quietly he listened to the angel, married Mary, and led her to the stable in Bethlehem. Faithfully he fled to Egypt to protect the baby Jesus from the murderous Herod. Years later Joseph led his family to Nazareth, where our Lord would grow into maturity and begin his ministry

Let us pray.

O God, who from the family of your servant David raised up Joseph to be the guardian of your Son and husband of his virgin mother: Give us grace to imitate his uprightness of life and his obedience to your commands; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

John 1:1-14

Gospeller: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.



Celebrant:

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you have made us for yourself; and when we had sinned against you and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent your only Son Jesus Christ into the world for our salvation.
